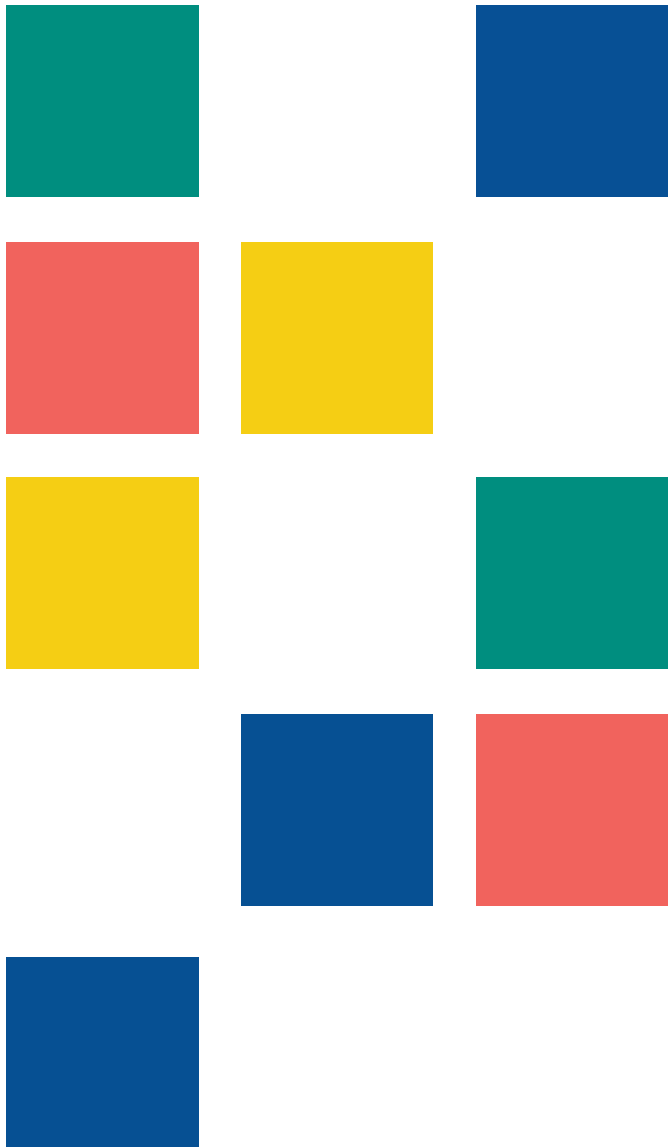


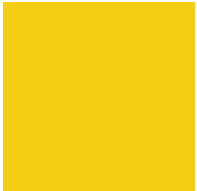

LLC is pleased to offer once again this exciting collaboration with the RIPO Music School, offering an in-depth exploration of the music to be played at several venues during the 2016 season. This course offers a great opportunity to develop an informed, active listening approach to classical music. Guest presentations by professionals will offer additional perspectives and enrich the learning experience.

**Course Schedule: Class members should pay particular attention to this unusual schedule, noting that the class does NOT meet weekly, but is based on performance schedules. This is a continuation of the class that started in January; members who registered during the Wintersession do not need to register again. Format: This course follows a discussion format. Participants lead collaborative sessions, choosing from among many participatory formats that include leading a discussion, guiding a listening session, giving post-concert reviews, giving short presentations and other options. Class discussions focus on specific pieces and composers in upcoming concerts.

Resources/Expenses: In addition to the registration fee, class members are expected to attend the Winter/Spring concerts of the Philharmonic, the Providence Singers, RI Chamber Music, as well as two Metropolitan Opera high-definition presentations. Discounted tickets to the live performances are available for those who are non-subscribers.

Coordinator: Bob Sandy is Professor of Economics Emeritus at Indiana University Purdue University at Indianapolis (IUPUI). Indianapolis' rich classical music scene nurtured Bob's lifelong love of music. Bob and his wife Elaine recently moved to Providence to be near their two grandchildren. Verdi and Wagner: The Clash of Titans

We will discover and discuss the essential differences between these two 19th century opera titans by viewing their biographies, listening to their music, and watching excerpts of their operas, which are still playing to packed houses around the world.

Format: Each session will include the use of DVDs. Presentations are encouraged!

Resources: Coordinator will distribute a packet with information about composers and a list of DVDs used.

Fact and Fiction

Have you ever dreamed of writing a short story or publishing a novel? Or maybe you just wanted to try your hand at creative writing, but were afraid to try. Fear no more. We have the class for you! In this workshop, we will throw caution to the wind (while avoiding clichés like that one) and experiment with all kinds of writing: poetry, scripts, fiction, nonfiction, personal essays, and more.

Format: Now in its fifth semester, Fact and Fiction uses a format that maximizes participation through writing exercises and critiques. Guest speakers inspire, motivate and instruct us in every phase of writing, from character development to self-publishing and beyond. Class members are encouraged to submit their manuscripts to any or all members of the group for outside-of-class gentle and constructive critiques.

Resources: The coordinators will occasionally recommend resources and encourage workshop members to do the same.

A House Divided: The Road to Civil War, 1850-1861

Coordinator: David Gagnon

This course will combine the participatory focus of an LLC course with the expertise of a web-based history course. Participants are asked to sign up for a free online course produced by Columbia University for EdX. The course – “House Divided: The Road to Civil War, 1850-1861” – reviews the institution of slavery and its central role in the Southern and national economies, as well as the political and social history of the 1850s. It traces how the expansion of slavery came to dominate national politics, and how political leaders struggled unsuccessfully to resolve the growing crisis.

Format: The EdX course has ten sessions corresponding to the subject matter of our class discussion. Each video session lasts approximately one hour and will provide background for our class discussion. Participants will be asked to choose the subject matter for each session (for example, the Dred Scott decision) and be the resource person for it in the discussion.

Resources: Those signing up for the course must be committed to reviewing the material for each week’s session. The EdX course provides visual material as well as an extensive bibliography for those interested in pursuing greater understanding of the subject.

Coordinator: David Gagnon has coordinated LLC classes in the past. He has been both an administrator and educator. His teaching background includes a range of experience from elementary school to university lectureships. His undergraduate degree was in American history with a focus on the Civil War and Reconstruction.

We are an independent, not-for-profit collaborative lifelong learning organization in Rhode Island, offering a program of affordable courses that cover a wide gamut of interests; trips and cultural events; as well as the opportunity to volunteer, serve on committees, coordinate a course and otherwise help shape the future of lifelong learning in our area. Our annual membership is low (\$25 yearly). You must be a member to participate in classes. Many of our classes fill within the first few days of registration. Origins of Modern Art, 1450-1950

We will explore the origins of modern art, some of which may surprise you. We'll go back 400 years to Giorgione, then on to Caravaggio, Manet and Cezanne. These four artists symbolize the four steps to modern art in the 20th century. After reviewing them, we will engage in collaborative presentations about the "isms" of the 20th century, such as Futurism, Surrealism, and Abstract Expressionism, in order to identify the relationship of the past to the present.

Format: Team-led presentations and discussions.

Resources: The lecture series, "Four Steps to Modern Art," will be available well before the start of the course. Suggested reading: *Aristotle's Children*, Richard E. Rubenstein.

Expenses: No expenses are anticipated.

Coordinator: Terry Duffy, a retired business executive, brings a lifetime of exploring museums and art history to LLC. This is Terry's second time as an LLC coordinator, following up on his 2014 course, "Art Gives Voice to History: A Visual Conversation."

All Things Poe!

Gruesome, terrifying, weird – Edgar Allan Poe was the master of horror, creating tales and poems that sear the brain and brand the heart. Everyone can quote his Raven's penultimate refrain of "Nevermore," but there is so much more to the art of Poe, the creator of detective fiction, insightful critic, perpetrator of hoaxes, satirist and ardent lover. Poe was brilliant and tortured – or was he calculating and logical? If you enjoy reading Poe, want to explore more about the man and his connection to Providence, then hop on the Poe train.

Format: In addition to the usual close reading and in-class participation and discussion, we'll head out on a field trip or two to visit the local haunts of Poe.

Resources: *The Fall of the House of Usher and Other Writings: Poems, Tales, Essays, and Reviews* by Edgar Allan Poe, Penguin Classics; Reissue edition (April 29, 2003), ISBN-13: 978-0141439815.

Expenses: No expenses are anticipated other than the purchase of the text.

Resources: The text will be *Don Quixote*, translated by Edith Grossman (Harper).

Expenses: No expenses are anticipated.

An artist of note, an art collector, a frequent museumgoer and an expert in the museum experience, his knowledge of the art world and curation is a perfect match for this course. Roberta Segal has co-coordinated art courses with Bunny Fain for many years. An artist in her own right, she defines herself as a "museum groupie," and has visited them all over the world. Lyrics and Lyricists

Ever had an old song going through your head, like “Blues in the Night” or “The Way You Look Tonight” or “My Funny Valentine?” Ever wondered who wrote the lyrics to these songs? This course will explore both the lyrics and their authors. Lyrics change with the times and differ according to musical genre. Possible subjects for study and discussion include lyrics as poetry, how lyrics enter the language, how lyrics have changed through time and how lyrics differ from genre to genre. We will also consider specific lyricists (biographical info, their influence on music, who/what influenced them, which composers they worked with). Other topics will depend on the

class’ interests. We’ll do lots of listening, laughing, reminiscing and discussing!

Format: Participants are asked to do a presentation on a lyricist and his music or some aspect of the lyrics, and to participate actively in discussions. YouTube and music clips will be helpful. No musical knowledge or ability is needed.

Resources: Some not required but useful books are *The Poets of Tin Pan Alley*, Philip Furia and *The American Popular Song*, by Alec Wilder. Both are available through the library and/or Amazon.com. There is lots of information on the Internet, including the lyrics of specific songs.

Expenses: No expenses are anticipated.

Coordinators: Nancy Riffle is a retired educator. She is lover of music, especially vocal. She is a member of two choruses and has participated in many Temple Beth-El Purim Spiels. The art and literature of Mexican society reflect its struggle to create a new national identity. They depict the birth of a new culture with unique characteristics that are neither totally Spanish nor fully indigenous. Mexico is heir to two cultural traditions, resulting in a unique and rich heritage. This has brought about a dislocation of the status quo and led to a struggle for power between the European and the Indian traditions. In this course, we will focus primarily on 20th century Mexican art and literature, with its many representations of the social upheavals and the class struggles of its time.

Format: Each class member will be asked to make a presentation or lead a discussion on a suggested topic, novel or artist.

Resources: Class members will read and discuss one or two suggested novels as well as suggested online resources for historical background.

Expenses: No expenses are anticipated.

Coordinators: Marilyn Kaplan is a long time member of BCLIR/LLC, current secretary of the board, and has coordinated courses in the past. Shula Schoenfeld grew up in Mexico and has an advanced degree in history from the Universidad Autonoma de Mexico.

Our goal in this class is to focus on the central tenets of Islam and the diversity of practice within Islam, and to improve our understanding of both normative Islam and the Islam of the extremists. We will also examine the sources of anger behind Muslim extremism and discuss the responses it provokes from both the West and

We will feature two plays at Trinity, (*To Kill a Mockingbird* by Harper Lee and *Oklahoma!* by Rodgers and Hammerstein), two plays at Gamm (*A Skull in Connemara* by Martin McDonagh and *The Winter's Tale* by William Shakespeare) and a new work TBD at the Wilbury.

Format: Participants will obtain and read copies of the scripts and attend a performance of each play. They will also lead short, lively discussions of themes, plots, characters, actors, directors' interpretations, and overall productions. We look forward to class participation by all members.

Actors or other members of the theater companies will join us on several occasions to enrich our understanding of the plays and the production process. Several classes may be at locations other than the Temple.

Resources/Expenses: In addition to the registration fee, there will be costs related to the purchase of some scripts and attending some of the performances. We will advise registrants of the amount of anticipated expenses prior to the beginning of the first class.

The Nature of Spirituality

Coordinators: Gordon Hayes, Carol Hoppe

We hear people say, "I'm spiritual but not religious." What is the distinction and how do we view our own spirituality? Former Poet Laureate Billy Collins has said this: "For the majority of its followers, religion is less of an experience than it is a set of beliefs, a moral code...." But spiritual experience is indeed an experience, usually marked by a sense of sudden entry into another dimension. A spiritual life may be one of surprising glimpses that often resist verbal description, as distinct from a sustained set of theological beliefs and doctrines. Wordsworth's phrase 'spots of time' nearly captures the nature of such intense moments of insight, in which time is pierced and

eternity is revealed. To help us on our quest, we will read *The Best Spiritual Writing of 2012*, ed. Philip Zaleski, Smith College, which features short stories, essays and poems from a number of different religious perspectives.

Format: Participants are expected to read the assigned material and come to class prepared for discussion. Each class member will be asked to make a presentation, lead a discussion or bring in a guest speaker to lead a session.

Resources: *The Best Spiritual Writing of 2012*, ed. Philip Zaleski.

Expenses: No expenses are anticipated other than the purchase of the text.

Coordinators: Carol Hoppe is a retired ESL teacher who has worked with people from a variety of cultures. Her interest in comparative cultures has inevitably led to an interest in comparative religion. Gordon Hayes is a retired corporate lawyer who practiced in large law firms in New York City and Boston. Great Writers' Interpretations of Illness, Death and Dying

"Illness is the night-side of life," wrote Susan Sontag in her 1978 book, *Illness as Metaphor*. Like other aspects of life's night-side, illness, temporary or terminal, both frightens and fascinates us. Many stories tell of individuals' despair, bravery, loss and sacrifice in their time of facing cancer, heart disease, madness, and all ills to which our bodies are subjected. How do writers and we react to such invasions? This seminar (not for the faint of heart) will examine short fiction and poetry on the subject by authors such as Anton Chekov, Richard Selzer and William Carlos Williams. We will personally relate to the subject of each work and hopefully come up with ideas to express our inevitable experiences with illness and dying.

Format: Each class member will be asked to lead one discussion of a selected topic. Participants should come to class prepared to contribute to discussions.

Resources: Coordinators will provide copies of materials, suggest online resources, or recommend titles.

Expenses: The cost of copying stories and possible purchase of inexpensive books.

Coordinators: Frankie Raben was a professor of English at Queens College, City University of New York, specializing in the study of drama as literature. Elsa Grieder has been a Hospice volunteer for 15 years.

The Making of Modern India, Part 1: From the Mughals to the Raj

Coordinators: Rosemary Colt, Robert Martin

From the rise of the Mughal Dynasty through the establishment of British Colonial rule, India experienced a period of social turmoil, war and political upheaval that laid the foundation for conflicts in India, Pakistan, and Afghanistan that have continued into the 21st century. In Part I of the course we will focus on the period from 1600 to 1857, during which the British East India Company gradually replaced the Mughal Dynasty as the dominant force in India. We will study the growth of "The Company" from a small trading outpost on the coast of India into an empire-building corporation that dominated Indian political and economic life, culminating in the destruction of the

Mughal Capital, Delhi in 1857. In Fall 2016, Part II will begin in 1857 and trace the path to independence from Britain in 1947.

Format: Participants will be expected to read the assigned texts, to participate actively in the discussions, and to give a presentation.

Resources: *The Great Moguls* by Bamber Gascoigne; *Love and Betrayal in Eighteenth-Century India*, William Dalrymple; *The Last Mughal: The Fall of a Dynasty*, William Dalrymple. These are available either on Amazon.com or on used book sites such as Abe Books. We will also be using Internet sites.

Expenses: No expenses are anticipated other than the purchase of the texts.

Coordinators: Rosemary Colt has an advanced degree in literature from Brown University, and has taught a variety of LLC courses. Robert Martin has recently retired as Assisted Living Administrator and Director of Finance director at Tockwotton on the Waterfront. This is his first time coordinating an LLC course.

Cities of the Future

For the past several years, we have explored cities in America and across the world, looking into what makes a city tick. This semester we will look to the future. Over the ten weeks, we will explore separate yet interrelated factors that impact cities today and into the foreseeable future. For example, rising sea levels and flooding threaten the very existence of some cities and global warming is creating havoc for many species that in turn affect the livability of some cities. Other factors include migration and demographic shifts, urban density and diversity, and of course, innovation and access to technology. We will study the nature of and the threats and opportunities of each of these, and we will look at specific cities to understand how they will determine its future.

Format: Individually or in teams, participants will research a particular element of change with a focus on its impacts upon cities. Participants will also select specific cities as case studies. Any city in the world is open for discussion.

Resources: Selected readings in PDF formats, articles and some video files will be suggested by the coordinator. Access to the Internet is required.

Expenses: No expenses are anticipated.

Coordinator: Sam Shamoon, the former City Planner for the city of Providence, is now president of LLC. He has coordinated the popular "Cities" courses for several years now.

Introduction to Genealogy

Format: The class will be a mix of "how to" and individual and group work on family genealogies. Participants will be expected to apply lessons/techniques from class to their own research and to share those experiences in class.

Resources: Coordinator will provide links to online resources.

Expenses: There are no expenses anticipated.

Coordinator: Lee Ashcraft, an amateur genealogist, has offered this LLC course in the past.

8. LLC reserves the right to cancel classes with fewer than ten participants up to the time of Convocation. The decision will be made jointly by the coordinator and the Curriculum Committee chair. The registrar will offer all people in cancelled classes the opportunity to sign up for other classes or to receive a full refund.
9. If a registrant withdraws from a class for any reason, a refund, minus a \$10 administrative fee, will be issued through Convocation. No refunds will be issued after Convocation unless there are extreme extenuating circumstances. **REQUESTS FOR REFUNDS MUST BE MADE IN WRITING** (email LLC Administration at info@lifelonglearningcollaborative.org). Refund requests made through the Coordinator(s) will not be honored.
10. Those on the waiting list who are not accepted into the class of their choice by the time of Convocation will be offered the opportunity to choose another class or receive a full refund.
11. Guests are welcome in LLC classes one time only, with the advance approval of the Coordinator(s). There are no auditors.
