Known as a poet and philosopher, Winogrand captured New York in the 1960s with his street photography and celebrity portraits. This is a retrospective view, with various contemporary street photographers commenting on Winogrand's work.

Two artists, Alice Varda (88) and "JR" (33) travel around rural France in JR's mobile camera truck, involving the locals in creating giant photos to be affixed to large structures. This was Varda's second to last work before her death in 2019. It has been called "an unassuming masterpiece." She was well known in France as the *Grandmother of the New Wave* in Cinematography.

This recent documentary on the hot topic of reparations to the Black community is timely. It takes us through the legal process of an aggrieved Black American's push to retrieve family photographs from the Peabody Museum at Harvard. These daguerrotypes had been commissioned in 1850 by acclaimed Harvard sociologist, Louis Agassiz, to support his belief that Africans were a separate and inferior race from caucasians. The case is still active. This movie will generate lively discussion.

This film has been called a documentary/mystery, as Vivian Maier died an Unknown. A "career nanny," she left behind an enormous number of photographs and unprocessed film. After her death in 2009, the mystery of her private life unfolded. Her work has now been exhibited all over the world and is regarded as top tier street photography material.

Errol Morris, cinematographer and good friend of Elsa Dorfman, collaborated with her on this film. Dorfman found fame through the use of her large-format Polaroid camera, capturing people in family portraits, dressed and accessorized as they chose. She moved from doing incidental photography In NYC to studio work in Cambridge with her enormous Polaroid camera. Over time, she established a very successful business, seizing the moment of an outgoing camera format and exploiting its capabilities with great enthusiasm.

This documentary is a tribute to deceased war photographer Tim Hetherington, directed by his good friend, author Sebastian Junger. The two collaborated on "Restrepo" in 2010. They traveled the world documenting conflicts, focusing on individuals in the midst of surrounding violence.

His body of work provides extraordinary coverage of #40, and #44, reminding us of the **civility and dignity** of past presidents. Souza's work is truly exceptional.
