Whether we experienced it as children or only through the stories and life choices made by our parents, we have all been influenced by the economic, social, political and cultural upheavals that began in 1929. The Great Depression had massive impacts in nearly all areas of American society. This course will explore the forces that allowed the Depression to happen and examine its far-reaching effects on such areas as manufacturing, labor relations, the political system, social safety net, family life, agriculture and mass communications.

Format: Each participant will be asked to lead a 50-minute class segment expanding on a particular aspect of the period. The session can take the form of a slide presentation, one or more videos, a talk by a guest speaker or provocative questions, allowing 20-25 minutes for group discussion. This is a Zoom video conferencing class (see box below for more information).

Resources/Expenses: Since Yesterday: The 1930s in America, by Frederick Lewis Allen, is available in libraries, on Kindle and in paperback new and used for \$5.00 and up.

Coordinators: Art Norwalk is a retired marketing communications consultant and former journalist. Bob Siminski is a retired educator and public-school superintendent. They previously coordinated a Global History course together.

Have you ever wondered how a bird, a whale, a bat, or a spider experiences the world? Or perhaps you've just wondered what was going on in the mind of a pet dog or cat? We all experience the world through our particular sensory bubbles, our umwelts. The ways the world can reveal itself through these unique senses is as varied as the species that inhabit it. In his 2022 book, *An Immense World*..., Pulitzer Prize winning science writer Ed Yong gives us surprising insights into those worlds using the latest research from leading scientists in the field of animal cognition. Using Yong's book, we will consider the varieties

of animal perception and approaches taken by contemporary scientists to explore what's unique about sensations in various species. We will learn how whales communicate across oceans, how bats use echolocation to hunt in total darkness, how loggerhead turtles and birds sense the earth's magnetic field for navigation, and how our intrusive actions are contributing to declining animal populations and extinctions.

Format: Each participant will focus on a particular aspect of animal sensation from one of the chapters in the book and lead the group in discussion of that topic. Presentations will address various ways animals sense the world – including unfamiliar ones, such as echoes, electric and magnetic fields, and vibrations – as we increase our awareness and understanding of animal sensation. This is a Zoom video conferencing class (see box on page 2 for more information).

Resources/Expenses: An Immense World: How Animal Senses Reveal the Hidden Realms Around Us by Ed Yong is available in paper, used for \$13 and up at Amazon and other online providers. There are no additional expenses.

Coordinator: Bill loves nature and science, belongs to the Skyscrapers, the local Astronomy club, and volunteers for the R.I. Audubon. His interest in animal cognition has been sparked in reading *An Immense World...*, on which this course is based. Bill has coordinated courses on poetry, Jazz and winter waterfowl.

We'll Always Have Düsseldorf: Investigating Europe's Lesser-Known Cities

Coordinator: Jonathan Shiff

A repeat of last year's popular course with all new cities! Paris, Rome, and Berlin are well-known to us, even if we've never been there. But what about Dijon, Nantes, or Bordeaux; Torino, Parma, or Padova; Salamanca, Zaragoza, York, and Krakow? In this course we will learn about Europe's lesser-known cities, studying their history, development, geography, demography, architecture, economy, and cultural life. Each city has a different story to tell. Why did it arise where it did? Did princes and bishops contribute most to its embellishment or was it rich Hanseatic merchants or silk traders? How were the inhabitants affected by religious wars and nationalist movements? And what happened there during World War II

and afterwards? Is the city associated with great writers, artists, culinary traditions? Each participant will be asked to research and present a different city chosen from a list of suggestions. Please note: This course is not about our travel experiences, although some of us may discover a future destination.

Format: Individual presentations, preferably with slides.

Resources/Expenses: No text, optional videos. No expenses.

Coordinator: Jonathan Shiff has participated in several LLC classes, and this will be his third outing as coordinator. Jonathan has degrees in music and a Ph.D. in Italian Renaissance Literature from UC Berkeley. His love of opera and art and architecture has led him to dozens of European cities, large and small.

Comfortable with the mainstream world of art music – 1600-1870 – the music that follows can present many new hurdles. Radical shifts in style, wide ranges of new influence, and new philosophies all combine to make the music of the last 120 years a kaleidoscope in which we are alternately soothed and discomfited. This course will explore the broad outlines and trends that occurred during this time and will seek to better equip the listener with ways to further explore this music. Composers covered will include Bartok, Stravinsky, Schoenberg, Hindemith, Britten, Shostakovich, Berg, Webern, Messiaen, Cage, Reich, Glass, and others.

Format: No musical background or knowledge is needed. The only requirement is an open ear, and willingness to listen to new music. Presentations from class members will be on the composers themselves, with no musical analysis required.

Resources/Expenses: None.

Coordinator: Ronald Pearl is a classical guitarist and composer with over forty years of professional activity. A professor of Music, he recently retired from Loyola University Maryland, where he taught for 27 years.

If so, join with LLC'ers who are experimenting with and enjoying cell phone photography and photo editing. It's creative, instructive, social, and fun. Our activities: Going on photo shoots together, sharing our photos with a congenial group, and learning about genres of photography, such as street, landscape, architecture, or other types. Our tools: Our cell phones (Apple or Android) and any editing app (i.e., Snapseed, Apple Photo, etc.). Familiarity with a photo editing app is necessary.

1:00-3:00 PM 8 weeks Sep 12-Oct 31 Fee: \$35 Class size limit: 20	NOTE: This is the second offering of a highly rated LLC course previously offered by Joe & Sidney in the Winter 2022 semester.
	Join Titanic descendant, Joe Petteruti, as he unearths the facts and artifacts of the ill-fated sinking of the RMS Titanic. Joe's grandmother, Bertha Mulvihill, emigrated from Ireland to the US in 1905, but went back to visit her family in Ireland in 1911. She returned on the Titanic to the US for her 1912 wedding in
	Providence. Miraculously, she survived the disaster. This class will look at Bertha's story and at the context

of the voyage, from construction of the ship to the rescue and the aftermath. It examines issues such as the role of White Star Lines and the socio-economic environment of Ireland and England. We'll look at the official inquiry, the exploration of the artifacts, and the fascination that the story still holds.

Format: After hearing about Bertha's voyage and rescue, participants will delve deeper into the Titanic story, choosing a topic from a list supplied by the coordinators, or a topic of their own choosing. They will create a 15–20-minute presentation and then lead a discussion on the topic. This is a Zoom video conferencing class (see box on page 2 for more information).

Resources/Expenses: Joe's book about his grandmother's experience: A Night She'd Remember, is available in soft cover on BookBaby.com at a discounted price of \$17.95 plus shipping. The e-book is available on both Amazon and BookBaby for \$4.99.

United States Supreme Court Decisions, 2020-2022

Coordinators: Sam Ventres, Philip Weinstein

The United States Supreme Court, with its conservative majority, has had a significant impact on the lives of American citizens and non-citizens alike. This course will allow participants to study, explore, and discuss recent decisions of the Court relating to access to abortion, gun control, separation of church and state, separation of powers of government, and school prayer to name a few. Citizens United v. Federal Election Commission although not recent has been included because of its importance on Candidate Financing. We will examine 19 decisions over 8 weeks, which will include the facts of each matter, the travel of the case through the lower courts, the majority opinion, the concurring opinions, and the dissenting opinions.

Participants will be invited to discuss their personal thoughts about the decisions and the effect the decisions have on society and life in our country during these difficult times. <u>Click here for details on each case</u>.

Format: Participants will be asked to choose and present one opinion or two if in the same subject matter they may be interested in studying, followed by discussion. This is a Zoom video conferencing class (see box on page 2 for more information).

Resources/Expenses: The resource will be the Supreme Court Decisions which are available online. There are no expenses.

Coordinators: Sam Ventres is a retired engineer with interests in history and economics. He has been a member of LLC for 12 years and has coordinated three courses. Philip Weinstein has been an attorney since 1968 licensed to practice in Rhode Island and Massachusetts. Fee: \$55	are harsh, funny, violent and at times impenetrable. They should stimulate lively discussions.
Class size limit: 14	Format: Prior to each class, roles will be assigned or, when necessary, we will go around the room, with everyone taking turns reading. There will be no presentations, but participants will be expected to do a

small amount of research on subjects or people brought up in the plays, and there will be required reading of articles to provide context for each play and to learn about the playwrights. We will read the following plays: Pinter: *The Birthday Party, The Homecoming, Betrayal* and Churchill: *Vinegar Tom, Cloud Nine, Top Girls*.

Resources/Expenses: The Essential Pinter – Selections from the work of Harold Pinter, Grove Press, 2006. Betrayal by Harold Pinter (this play can be purchased used, as a single play). Churchill Plays One, Methuen, 1985. Top Girls, Methuen, 1982. All books can be purchased used at Thrift Books, Abe Books, or Amazon Used Books for \$4-\$7 each. And of course, there's always the library.

Coordinator: Wendy Salkind coordinated Chekhov Aloud for LLC this past Spring. Her background is as a university Professor of Theatre and an actress.

REGISTRATION POLICY

- 1. Lifelong Learning Collaborative (LLC) classes are filled on a "first come/first served" basis up to the enrollment limit. Enrollment limits will include coordinators. No exceptions will be made to the enrollment limits.
- 2. No registration is accepted until payment is received.
- 3. Date/time of registration will be determined by the postmark of registrations sent in by mail.
- 4. Online registration is recommended. Because mailed registrations will not be processed before 2 PM on the day registration opens, spaces are not guaranteed if the class fills up prior to 2 PM. There are no exceptions.
- 5. A waiting list of up to four people will be formed after a class is full. People will be offered the opportunity of registering for an alternative course in lieu of remaining on the waiting list. When a waiting list is full, applicants turned away from a course will be encouraged to register for another course.
- 6. Coordinators need not register or pay for the courses they coordinate. They must, however, be paid members of LLC.
- 7. The registrar will send, on a daily basis, by email or USPS (for members without email) acknowledgment of registration.
- 8. LLC reserves the right to cancel classes with fewer than ten participants. The decision will be made jointly by the coordinator and the Curriculum Committee chair. Those registered in cancelled classes will be given the opportunity to sign up for other classes or to receive a full refund.
- 9. If a registrant withdraws from a class for any reason, a refund, minus a \$10 administrative fee, will be issued up to one week before the start date of the class. No refunds will be issued after that time unless there are extreme extenuating circumstances. REQUESTS FOR REFUNDS MUST BE MADE IN WRITING (email info@lifelonglearningcollaborative.org). Refund requests made through the Coordinator(s) will not be honored.

Rhode Island's southern shores and local ponds are a birding paradise in early winter. Join seasoned birders Bill Carpenter and Emily Westcott for a five-week course (two classroom sessions and three field

birding sessions) to learn more about loons, buffleheads, goldeneyes, mergansers, grebes and harlequin ducks, to name just a few. A Photographic Journey: Working on A Personal Project

Note: We will offer two identical sessions; three classes will be held on Zoom (see box on page 2) and the final class will be in-person at Temple Beth-El so that students can share their projects.

Every photographer follows a path in search of his or her vision. This class will emphasize developing your vision around one topic/subject which could be the start of a larger inquiry whether for a book, exhibition, lifelong fascination, or simply the joy of pursuing a subject to help expand your creativity. You will choose your topic and the course material will help you explore the concepts in developing and presenting your project. This class will provide you with the opportunity to delve deeper beyond single images and to create a project in a small, supportive group environment. Some knowledge or familiarity with basic editing (native editing in phone and/or Snapseed) is helpful, but proficiency is not required.

Format: Participants will be given weekly homework assignments consisting of reading, videos, and individual photo shoots* with photo submissions (via email). The first three classes will be on Zoom and will consist of a discussion of photo topics and sharing/critiquing of individual photos from the weekly assignments and review of the projects. The final class will be in person so that students can share their project with each other. *Note: Photo shoots will be done on your own.

Resources/Expenses: There may be a cost associated with printing images. Your camera or camera phone and access to a computer or iPad are required.

Coordinators: Sally Barker and Donna Parker have coordinated highly successful photography classes many times in the past and are avid and experienced photographers.
