Syllabus: Inspiring Women Leaders OCTOBER 5, 2023 Presentation Schedule Update

What we hope to do

In keeping with the promise that we made in the catalog, **Inspiring Women Leaders** is a course designed to sharpen our definition of leadership by examining leadership qualities through a lens of women who have inspired us. How does leadership differ from heroism? What about a flawed leader or a leader who has experienced a serious leadership defeat? Are there disqualifying characteristics? As the weeks go by, we will construct our list of qualities or characteristics for true leadership as we see them through our deep dive into the lives of inspiring women.

An Invitation to Participate

Each week we will discuss two topics, including individual women of note or a group of women who have led the call for change or innovation in a specific area. We ask the session leader to provide information about the lives of these women, the circumstances that brought them into leadership, and their impact on the world around them.

The session leader then leads a discussion about the leadership qualities we witnessed or wondered about.

For the first class, we will invite participants to name an inspiring woman leader, perhaps someone not yet included in the syllabus and to list their own characteristics of an inspiring woman leader.

Class Format:

- This is a Zoom video conferencing class. Presentations through screen sharing are welcomed but not necessary. We can provide technology assistance/backup if requested.
- Discussion leaders/presenters select one or more of the women listed for their date/hour.
- Each session allows about 50 minutes for presentation and discussion. There are two sessions per class.
- A discussion leader may substitute another woman if s/he finds someone MORE inspiring under the given category.
- Note that some fields (government, human rights) were large enough for us to devote two classes to them.
- You are invited to lead more than one session. This "bonus" presentation may include a duet or a panel of leaders.
- The coordinators will update and distribute the schedule below until all presentations have been spoken for. First come, first served, of course.
- Unless announced in advance, THERE IS NO HOMEWORK!

Having said that there is usually no homework, here's an **optional** homework assignment to complete before the first class: **See the movie, "Barbie."**

For a bonus credit, ask a young person what s/he thought of it.
