Course Description

Where did you grow up? Boston or Berlin? Minneapolis or Mumbai? Or have you lived all over the globe in a string of towns? Whatever your answer, please join us to share your impressions of that special place you call "home."

This course will provide a rich opportunity for cross-cultural learning within our LLC community as we study our diverse backgrounds together. History, geography, local culture, personal experiences, cherished memories, and family photos can all play a part.

To accompany our studies, we'll be reading an insightful memoir by acclaimed author Joan Didion entitled *Where I Was From*. This book, as Didion writes, is "an exploration into my own confusions about the place and the way in which I grew up." It's a riveting piece of reportage that's sure to inspire us.

Format

Each class member will give a presentation on the town they consider home. The course will also include a screening of the 1985 film *The Trip to Bountiful*, adapted from the award-winning play by Horton Foote, about an elderly woman's longing to return to her small hometown one last time.

<u>Guidelines for Presentations</u> Where I Was From: Joan Didion & Your Hometown Fall 2023

We're very fortunate to have our own Technology Coordinator, Laura Tucker, to help class members with their presentations as needed. Please see info below & ask Laura for help on any aspect!

FORMAT

Each week two participants will give a presentation and lead a discussion for the group, one participant in Session A and the other in Session B. One of our sessions will be devoted to a movie (which we'll watch in advance) entitled *The Trip to Bountiful*, based on the play by Horton Foote and discuss it in one of our sessions. Our final session will be a Roundtable Discussion of our textbook & what we've learned in the class.

- A. Participants will select the topic of their presentations in advance in response to an email the Coordinators will send out after you're enrolled in the class. We'll need about 12 presenters given our schedule for the semester. Since we have more participants enrolled than that, presentations will be assigned on a first-come, first-served basis when it's time to sign up. If you wish, you may double up with a partner on the same hometown.
- B. There are many different formats you may use for your presentation, including Power Point, Google Slides, videos, film clips, flip charts, and handouts. But no matter what format you use, be sure to include plenty of pictures and visual aids to enhance the appreciation and understanding of your hometown. If you have garments, accessories, or other items that are relevant to your topic, bring them along to show to the class! Want to dress up in an outfit representative of the area? Do it!
- C. Each week the coordinators will assign several chapters of our textbook, *Where I Was From*, by Joan Didion, for you to read. This reading will complement our course topics and the presentations you'll be giving, When you present, you may also wish to suggest an article or video ahead of time. Please try to get this information to us as early as possible after you select your topic so we can incorporate it into the syllabus. If that's not possible, then at least a week ahead of time so we can share with the class by email.
- D. Ideally **your presentation should be approximately 30 minutes long with an additional 15 minutes for a discussion** led by you with assistance from the coordinators.

CONTENT

Class members will give presentations on the town (or towns) they consider home. History, geography, local culture, personal experiences, cherished memories, and family photos can all play a part. It's your choice – but remember, **make sure there are stimulating visual elements for maximum effect.**

RESEARCH

- A. **The Internet has a wealth of information** on your topic. Just enter a search request for your hometown and you may be surprised and delighted at what comes up for your review (e.g., articles, videos, film clips, etc.)!
- B. **Books and magazines are another great source of information** (from the local library -- or try Amazon, Abe, E-Bay, etc. if you care to purchase at nominal cost).
- C. **Prior discussion of presentation with coordinators:** The coordinators welcome the opportunity to meet with you before your presentation to discuss your topic and strategize on how to present it. Meetings can be scheduled in person or by phone or email.

ADDITIONAL TIPS

- A. We will be studying your hometowns -- very special places! Your fellow classmates will be excited to hear what you have to say because your presentation will provide a rich opportunity for crosscultural learning within our LLC community. By studying our diverse backgrounds together, we'll get to know one another better and expand our horizons at the same time! So relax & enjoy putting your presentation together -- you'll have an eager audience!
- B. **Get organized!** Your fellow classmates will get the most from your presentation if it is presented systematically. Make an outline what do you want to say and when do you want to say it? For example, you could start with an introduction that grabs their attention, continue with an illustrated discussion of relevant aspects of your hometown and your experiences there, and end your remarks with a pithy conclusion that stimulates them to learn even more.
- C. **Please do not read your entire presentation.** It is fine to work from notes but be sufficiently familiar with your material that you can speak to your classmates naturally. Eye contact is important too!
- D. **Rehearse your presentation in advance**. Make sure you can move through your content easily within the allotted time. You might want to get feedback by presenting to a fellow classmate, friend, or family member. Listen to their suggestions and revise your remarks to improve your impact on the listener.
- E. Check and recheck the technology you are using as part of your presentation. Verify the compatibility in the week before your presentation e.g., if you're using Power Point or Google Slides, bring your USB key/jump drive to the coordinators and test it with the equipment in the course room (this will just take a few minutes).
